From the Mayor

It is good to have the team back around the Council table with the start of the new triennium. And a big welcome to Aaron Rangihika who joins our elected team. Aaron's experience in governance and his passion for Kawerau will be a great addition to our Council.

I would also like to acknowledge and thank all the people who put themselves forward as candidates in the election. It takes a certain bravery to put yourselves forward in this very public process. Now the election is behind us, it is business as usual. The Council have begun the new term with a call for more inclusion of community representatives on our community committees.

We have called for interest for three community representatives to be on the Creative Communities Assessment Committee to join three councillors, two iwi representatives and an arts representative. Nominations close this Friday, 29 November (more details in this newsletter).

Council are also looking for community representatives to become involved with decisionmaking regarding access for those with a disability and the elderly.

Water is again in our scope with the Government briefing on the Fresh Water Reform and Three Waters Review which myself and chief executive Russell George attended in Wellington last week. These reforms and reviews will guide our decision-making. In parallel, Council is progressing the planning of the water reticulation system replacement programme. This is likely to be an ongoing project as investigations show that much of the pipework is still in good working order. We are also starting a review on rubbish and recycling which is an issue for all of us, Council, businesses and consumers, as we all have a part to play. The Council has increased costs at the Transfer Station this year to cover the costs of its operation and to transport our district's general waste to the Tirohanga landfill.

The annual King of the Mountain Race was a great event held recently. In my usual post at the top of Putauaki maunga, I enjoyed greeting the entrants when they reached the summit. Congratulations to all the entrants especially those from Kawerau and the Eastern Bay. Full credit to Lee Barton, Amy Hayes and their team, and all our volunteers for putting on another quality event in Kawerau.

We look forward to next year's 65th 'gold card' anniversary event and increased participation from our locals to celebrate this special milestone.

In the lead-up to Christmas we have the Kawerau Christmas in the Park event on Saturday, 14 December.

Finally, a note of caution, as with a dry hot summer predicted, we ask all residents to be vigilant with the risk of fire to our district.

Summer reading gains are in the bag

Children who do not read much over the long summer holidays can lose the gains they have made in their reading levels and fluency over the year. This is true for all children, but especially for children who are already struggling readers.

Kawerau Library's annual summer learning programme aims to bump these reading gains for children with a goody bag full of rewards.

Children from pre-school to pre-teen can join the programme. No registrations are required, simply pick up a free ticket at the library from Thursday, 12 December onwards. Then every time the child reads a book or joins in holiday activities at the library and museum they get the ticket clipped.

When children have their ticket clipped ten times, they can collect their goody bag full of rewards, from LEGO packs to playing cards and juggling balls.

A free book is also on offer for those who pickup their tickets before 12 noon on Christmas Eve.

KEEP SAFE YOUR KEEPSAKES (KSK)

The weekend preventative conservation workshop, Keep Safe Your Keepsakes (KSK), included in-situ cleaning and rehousing demonstrations of common collection types, a display of the many conservation-grade materials useful for housing taonga at home, and a wealth of take-home resources on caring for various collection types.

The highlight for the Sir James Fletcher Museum Curator Anastajza Harding as a conservator was the opportunity to engage with future generations to whom the taonga at home would be passed onto. "To hear the stories told by the owners of the items brought in for examination and advice was really uplifting".

The Council Offices in Ranfurly Court will close early at 4pm on Friday, 6 December to enable all staff to attend the annual Kawerau District Council staff Christmas function. This is an important event to recognise and thank staff for their work during the year and we apologise in advance for any inconvenience.

The Council Offices will observe the Christmas and New Year closedown period and the offices will be closed from midday on Tuesday, 24 December 2019 and re-open for business as usual at 8.00am on Monday, 6 January 2020.

Dumping of Rubbish

People who illegally dump their rubbish are costing their friends, family and neighbours.

Illegal dumping rubbish or fly tipping as it is also known, in the Kawerau District cost ratepayers \$45,000 in the last financial year.

Thanks to vigilant residents, Council received more than 41 requests to pick up rubbish illegally dumped in the district.

Usually it is Kawerau District Council staff who picks up the illegally dumped rubbish, which still has a cost, as it diverts staff from their usual responsibilities. Contractors are also used, particularly after-hours.

For a small district spending \$45,000 on picking up rubbish that is illegally dumped is a big "waste" of resources.

If you separate your rubbish the cost will be less at the Transfer Station which has had to increase the charges to cover the operating costs.

Rubbish is an issue for everyone, not just Councils, we as consumers are all responsible for what we buy, use and re-use, recycle and dispose of.
