
# Anzac Day 2024

## Annual Plan 2024/25

If you want to have your say on the Annual Plan for 2024-2025 – please ensure your submission is received by Council by 5pm on Tuesday, 14 May 2024.

Kawerau District Council is completing an Annual Plan this year from 2024-2025. Council proposes an overall rates increase of 15.1% that maintains our current levels of service.

The weekly increase for each property will vary depending on the individual value of residential, commercial, and industrial properties

Council is proposing to increase the uniform annual general charge (UAGC) from \$850 to \$950 in 2024-2025.

Submission forms were sent with the latest rates instalments; they are also available on the Council website or at the library, isite or Council Offices.

If you wish to present your submission in person to the Mayor and elected members, the Annual Plan Hearing will take place on Wednesday, 22 May 2024 from 9am. Contact Council to book a suitable time.





## Rangi Delamere Centre respening

Hundreds gathered to be part of the official reopening of the Rangi Delamere Centre recently. Heteraka Chris Hall of St Gerard's Catholic Church opened with a karakia | prayer in front of the outside sign before getting revealed by Her Worship the Mayor Faylene Tunui and Kauri Thornton (brother to Rangi Delamere). The Rangi Delamere sign was made and installed by Flame Cut Profiles Kawerau.

Tūwharetoa ki Kawerau Kaumātua and Council Cultural Advisor Te Haukakawa Te Rire uncovered the carving at the northern entrance, which was completed by Heke Collier. Paul Delamere (nephew of Rangi Delamere) talked about what the carving represents.

The third unveiling was a photo and a plaque dedicated to Rangi Delamere by mokopuna (and daughter of eldest son Larry), Kim Delamere Westrup who read the plaque that listed Rangi Delamere's many achievements and contributions to Kawerau and the Eastern Bay community.

As the mihi whakatau | welcome continued there were speeches from lwi, special guests and family of Rangi Delamere who all demonstrated the admiration and love everyone had for Rangi Delamere.

Council acknowledges and thanks NZCT (NZ Community Trust) for their generosity and support of \$300,000 towards the rebuild of the Rangi Delamere Centre.

### **COUNCIL BRIEFS**

### **Dog Fees**

Dog registration fees are increasing from July 1, 2024, by 4.7% (rate of inflation). The decision to increase the fees by 4.7% was made at a Council Meeting on Wednesday, April 24, 2024. Dog registration fees contribute 14.4% of the total dog control activity costs.

### The new fees will be:

- Neutered (de-sexed) dog \$42 (\$2 increase from \$40).
- Entire (unneutered) dog \$84 (\$4 increase from \$80).

Dog registration fees are due for payment by 5pm, 31 July 2024.

# Local Government (Electoral Legislation and Māori Wards and Constituencies) Amendment Bill

Thank you to the everyone who filled out our early engagement survey for the Representation Review. We appreciate the time that more than 70 people took to have their say.

Council is completing a representation review following the introduction of Māori representation (via Māori wards). Council must complete the review by September 2024 for the upcoming election in 2025.

Last month, the coalition government announced the Local Government (Electoral Legislation and Māori Wards and Constituencies) Amendment Bill would be enacted by late July 2024. The Bill will restore the pre-2021 poll provisions and mean (once the Bill is law) Council will need to:

- Rescind the decision to introduce Māori wards at the 2025 election OR
- Proceed with Māori wards in place for the 2025 to 2028 period AND Carry out a binding poll at the 2025 elections

The outcome of the public vote will remain in place for the 2028 and 2031 triennial periods.

Council will keep the community informed.

### Fluoridation extension sought

At a meeting on Wednesday April 24, Council unanimously agreed to request an extension from the Director General of Health to the deadline to fluoridate Kawerau's drinking water.

The original directive from the Director General of Health to Council in July 2022, had a 30 June 2024 deadline. Council will now request an extension to this deadline.

Council acknowledges the petition by 723 residents opposing the directive to fluoridate received by Council on 13 December 2023, and further requests in writing and in person at recent public forums.

Although Council cannot consult on the directive – that power is for the Ministry of Health and Director General of Health to exercise, Council is mindful that that members of the community take a firm view on the merits or otherwise of the directive and the issue of fluoridation. Council will keep residents informed of the request to extend this deadline.

## Water trunk main replacement success

Recently, Kawerau District Council and Loveridge contractors undertook major water pipe replacement work on the trunk main from the reservoirs at Monika Lanham Reserve to the reticulation that services residents.

## Congratulation Putauaki Trust

On Thursday 28 March Putauaki Trust opened a new office 'Te Whare Ohaaki' in Tamaoho Drive in Kawerau. Mayor Faylene Tunui attended the event on behalf of Council. The opening recognised current trustees and inaugural trustees who have recently passed Tamaoho Waaka Vercoe and Anaru Rangiheuea.
